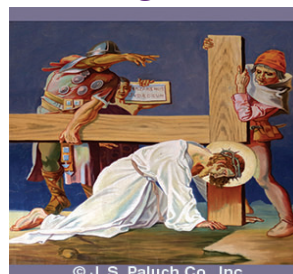

FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

MARCH 27, 2022

BE TRANSFORMED

Who knew that when Moses led the Israelites out of slavery it would mean forty years of wandering in the desert before they were able to enter the Promised Land? Many of us experience periods of wandering in our life. Perhaps we made some poor judgment calls in our younger days, or maybe as adult children we returned home to live because of struggling with substance abuse, or unemployment, or a divorce. Or maybe we fell away from Church for a bit. This is nothing new. The second reading calls us to be new creations in Christ, to put away our old selves, to be transformed; and in the Gospel we hear the beautiful story of the Prodigal Son. Each of these calls for us to move, and grow, and leave old ways behind.

TESTING THE BOUNDARIES

Some of the first words a two-year-old might say are “Do by self!” It is almost a rite of passage for teenagers to test their parents as much as they can. Every parent who ever lay awake in bed at night waiting to hear the sound of the child pulling the car into the garage or opening the door knows at least as much about praying vigils as any nun in a convent. This is a deep and earnest prayer, and the parents can barely breathe until their child comes home. Usually when we think of the story of the Prodigal Son, we think of the feeling of guilt the son had as he realized how much he had messed things up, or we feel the injustice that the older brother felt, because he wasn’t the rebel child leaving the home.

WELCOME HOME

What we don’t often remember in the story of the Prodigal Son is that God is there welcoming, urging us on. A few years ago there was a funeral for a young man who died of a drug overdose within days of coming out of a treatment center. Many of his young friends came but expected fire and brimstone, and to be told what a bad child that boy was. Instead, the priest preached about God loving this child so much that perhaps the only way God could protect him was to bring him home. That gentle image of God welcoming him with open arms soothed the broken hearts and unspoken questions that were on many minds. Not every situation is that drastic, but God is calling us home this Lent no matter what mistakes we’ve made, or how many times we have made them.

What Have You Given Back To God?

Deacon John Hall's Homily from the Third Sunday of Lent, March 20, 2022

True or false: The Stations of the Cross at St. Andrew's Cathedral downtown were ordered extra large so that people could see them better. False. They were intended for the cathedral in Chicago and somehow they ended up in LR.

True or false: In the 179 year history of the Diocese of Little Rock, every bishop found Arkansas to be a welcoming home and loved it here. False. Our first Bishop Andrew Byrne, in 1843 first visited here and the wrote to Pope Gregory and said thanks but no thanks.

True of False: Catholics have a reputation of not knowing their bible. True! Let's disprove that – right now.

Our First Reading was taken from the Book of Exodus. It is considered one of the foundational books of the bible as it was the first time that God intervened in human history. We can connect a few of the specifics of the Book of Exodus to historical people, places and events.

The reading focuses on Moses his life and how he answered God's call. Moses was born in? Egypt. His parents were? Hebrews. When Moses was born there was an order from Pharaoh to kill all the male newborns. Moses life was spared because his birth mother hid him for three months. When she could no longer hide him she put him in a basket in the reeds on the banks of the Nile. Who found the basket? Pharaoh's daughter found the basket and told Pharaoh's daughter ordered her servant to find a Hebrew woman to nurse this child. Who was selected? Moses own mother. Moses grew up in the House of the Pharaoh. When Moses was an adult, one day he saw? An Egyptian striking a Hebrew. In the process of defending the Hebrew victim, he killed the Egyptian. Pharaoh heard of the incident and wanted Moses killed. So Moses fled to Midian. While in Midian, he met Zipporah and helped her water her flock. After Zipporah returned home, she told her father, Reuel/Jethro, what happened. So Zipporah's father invited Moses to eat with them. Moses and Zipporah married. They had a son named Gershom. A long time passed during which the king of Egypt died.

God saw the Israelites, and God knew it was time to act. And that's where our First Reading begins. The Burning Bush.

Life was good for Moses. He had been truly blessed. His life was spared at birth. He grew up in a well-to-do lifestyle -- the total opposite of his enslaved Hebrew kinfolk. Moses was well educated and wealthy, because he grew up in the royal house of Pharaoh. He was spared the life of slavery, and he was now living a comfortable life in Midian with his wife and her family.

But had Moses given anything back? No. And it was not because he owed God — but because he was grateful for what he had been given. God's appearance in the burning bush got the attention of Moses -- and he didn't ignore God or run away. He listened to God, and after some reluctance, he accepted God's call to be a leader of the Hebrew people.

Every one of us has experienced a burning Bush in our lives because if we hadn't . . . we wouldn't be here this morning. But like the olive tree in the gospel parable: Have we given back? The gardener in the parable reminds us that we stand on fertile ground and it's time to produce some fruit – give back. On Ash Wednesday we heard the words: Repent **and** believe in the Gospel. Remember the rich man who asked Jesus: What must I do to inherit eternal life? Keeping the Ten Commandments isn't enough. Go and sell what you have, give it to the poor and come follow me. Not because we owe God anything, not because I'm trying to earn my way into heaven. We simply give back out of gratitude for the blessings received and because we love and care for one another. We pray that our Lord helps us to be like Moses. To recognize God's voice, to see God's presence, to answer God's call, and to stand with God on holy ground.

"The Kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that will produce its fruit" Mt 21:43.

Jesus implies in this statement that the chief priests and elders are like the tenants of the vineyard, killing all those sent to collect the landlord's produce. It's easy to think he was only addressing them since they would conspire to kill him, the Son of God. But one of my teachers used to say that every Gospel story is true, and every Gospel story is about you. So we must ask: how is this statement addressed to us in our time? What is the fruit of the Kingdom of God, and how might I be failing to produce it? Since God is love, the fruit must also be love. Producing this fruit is the simple, yet sometimes wrenchingly difficult practice of loving more today than I did yesterday. It's being kind to those I don't like, being patient with those who annoy me, and forgiving myself for the fact that it's hard.

An excerpt from *Living with Christ*

I read this excerpt one morning when I was with some people who were trying my patience. After reading it, I looked up and said, "Okay God, I hear you." It is amazing to me sometimes how God speaks to us when we take the time to listen. If the author above is correct, this story was addressed to me because I was supposed to be loving and remembering that God was inside these people. Somehow I had to find him so that the time we were together would *produce fruit* and be beneficial to us all. Sometimes God has to hit us over the head for us to see the truth; at least, he has to hit me over the head every now and then.

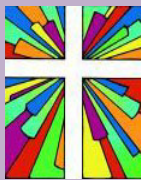
